#### AGInnovation Ribbon-Cutting

Commissioners Jerry Daeke and Frank Quis, along with several County staff, attended



a ribbon-cutting ceremony on September 7 for the new Sandhills AGInnovation Center located in Ellerbe. The AGInnovation Center is a non-profit established with \$500,000 in grant funds secured from the Golden LEAF Foundation through a partnership between Moore County Partners in Progress, the Moore and Richmond County Cooperative Extension Services, and Moore and Richmond County governments. It will help farms transitioning from growing tobacco to fruit and vegetable production to distribute their crops to profitable local and statewide markets.
